The Pugwash boys won the 2013 provincial championship. The team went undefeated in division 4 boys for 2013 and won the Northumberland regional banner and the Provincial banner for the school and community. Records show that this is the first undefeated season for boys basketball in the school's history. The boys in the regular season were undefeated in division 3 beating the provincial division 3 champions, Shelburne Rebels.

In the Regional final in Truro, Pugwash defeated Colchester Christian Academy for the banner 77-55. In the provincial 3 games, Pugwash defeated Fountain Academy 92-65, Colchester Academy 80-64 and in the championship Pugwash defeated hosts, Ecole du Sommet, 66-58 in a defensive battle.

Master Plan Report: Multi Purpose Centre

Over the last two years, the Multi-purpose Centre Action Committee has worked with various representatives from CREDA and the Municipality of Cumberland County to develop a strategic plan, look at possible sites, arrange for funding and hire an architectural firm to, in consultation with the community, develop a Conceptual Design and Business management Model for the Multi-purpose Centre. This process has unfortunately met frequent delays. We had hoped to have completed our consultation with Ron Burdock and associates of WHW Architects by this point, but due to several changes in the liaisons appointed by CREDA and changes in the scope of the original project, there were some concerns by the original funding partners that needed to be addressed. The end result of these delays have meant that the funding deadlines have lapsed and will need to be applied for again. We are assured that the money will be there when we do and that this project is still looked at favourably by all levels of government.

The good news is that, with the departure of CREDA and the reorganization of the regional development associations in the province in March, this project will not fall through the cracks. We have been assured that the county will now be the lead on the project. In March our new liaison will follow through with the reapplication for funding process. As we have done all the preliminary work on that, this should be expedited. We are hopeful that the project will move forward now that the county has taken the reins.

Master Plan Report: WATER SUPPLY INVESTIGATION

Commencing January 16th, six test wells were drilled in the Pugwash River area. Between Feb 27th and March 3 a 72 hour pump test was carried out on one of the wells at a rate of 85 gallons per minute. The pumping well along with two nearby observation wells were monitored for draw down. Water quality samples we taken from both the pumping and observation wells. The results of the program to date are promising but we will continue our exploration program later this spring as we attempt to find a site that will provide both the quantity and quality of drinking water we will need to supply the needs of the Village of Pugwash.

Patricia Harrington, District Care Manager Seniors Health with the Cumberland Health Authority made a presentation to CHB at the February meeting on *Home First*, which is a new Continuing Care Program.

Home First is program that will provide enhanced services to assist people to promptly return home from hospital to recover their health in their own environment. New Government funding will provide services that have not been available before. The benefits of being at home include being in one's own environment with loved ones, friends and neighbours. Patients are more at ease with their own pets, food and favourite entertainment and regular schedule. Independence is maintained and chance of infection is much less.

Home Support provides relief for caregivers, aids with meal preparation, personal care and housekeeping. If required, arrangements can be made to loan out a hospital bed or the equipment to provide portable oxygen. Other services can be provided to eligible clients such as home maintenance, transportation, snow removal and meal preparation.

All interested clients/families must meet with a care coordinator to determine needs and eligibility. In Cumberland County there are currently about 800 clients receiving home nursing and home support services. These are provided by approximately 45 nurses and over 100 home support providers.



The Friends of the Pugwash Estuary (FOPE) held their Annual General Meeting on Saturday, February 16 at the Northumberland Community Curling Club. Approximately 35 people attended to listen to an update of accomplishments of 2012, hear of future plans and listen to guest speaker, Bob Bancroft.

Bob Bancroft, well-known biologist, forester, and naturalist spoke eloquently on the topic "Broken Rivers – Ecological Restoration". Bob presented a poignant illustration of how streams that are healthy for aquatic life and support both flora and fauna, tend to have varied flow, multiple waterfalls for aeration, deep pools, crooked, meandering paths and wide vegetation zones surrounding them.

Many of today's rivers in Nova Scotia are the antithesis of this – a result of centuries of clear cutting, straightening of rivers to transport logs, destructive farming practices, draining of wetlands and various other human activities that have impacted heavily on the natural environment.

Today, community organizations like the Friends of the Pugwash Estuary, are working to reverse this damage. Through the installation of digger logs and deflectors in streams, clearing and repairing of culverts, planting of trees along streams, fencing off cattle from streams, and various other activities waterways are gradually being restored. Unfortunately, governments and many industries have yet to buy into the program. For example, the currently mandated narrow vegetation strip along waterways does little for the wildlife — especially the variety of songbirds - competing for this space.

As an illustration of things individuals could do to promote wildlife friendly environment, Bob demonstrated some of the ideas he is trying on his property in Antigonish County. These include things as simple as leaving dead trees standing, creating hollow logs for nesting, leaving or creating brush piles and building nesting boxes.

For those interested in more serious intervention, one could create wetlands or ponds, which will promote diverse habitat for insects, amphibians, birds, fish and animals. What can you do?

Pugwash Ground Search and Rescue Team was formed in 1978. In 1988 the members financed and built the PGSAR building in the Village of Pugwash. It is used for meetings, training and events. To date, there are 25 volunteer members who dedicate time and knowledge to this organization and continue to train. The Pugwash Ground Search and Rescue (PGSAR) is a volunteer group working under the Emergency Measures Organization (EMO). The Team assists local, municipal and provincial authorities during emergencies and at times is asked to provide support to other teams in the province. The Team owns a mobile Command Unit for assignments that are of long duration or complicated. In the Province of Nova Scotia the Search Teams have a Training Standard to follow so that all searchers are qualified at the same levels. We train our searchers in Map and Compass; First Aid and CPR; Survival; Search and Rescue Techniques; GPS units and Radio Communications.

If you are 19 years of age, physically and mentally fit for outdoor tasks, and are available to volunteer your time for training, meetings, fundraising, events and searches, then contact us, we are now accepting new membership applications.

Pick-up day is Tuesdays.
Garbage and compost are picked up alternate weeks with recycling picked up the other Tuesday. ONE non-clear "privacy bag" per clear, non-coloured bag of residential garbage is permitted. Multiple non-clear bags such as solid colour kitchen catchers or grocery bags will no longer be accepted. Schedules are available at the Village Hall.

It is an offence to either dump household garbage (including kitty litter) in Village public solid waste receptacles or to remove refundables from them.

Refundable containers are redeemed and the funds go to local charities.
